Two Distinguished Alumni Honored

Each year, the Washington University Dental Alumni Association recognizes an alumnus (or alumni) who have served the School, our profession, the community and/or our Association with dedication and energy. This year two alumni were honored: Fumio Tsuji, '52 and Eloy Gutierrez, '54.



Dr. Fumio Tsuji

Dr. Fumio Tsuji was born in Hakalua, Hawaii and attended Hamakuapoko grade school and Maui High School. He received his Bachelors Degree at the University of Hawaii in 1948 after having also attended the University of Chicago. In 1949, he entered Washington University in St. Louis School of Dentistry, graduating in 1952. He has been in the private practice of dentistry in Kahului until his recent retirement.

A member of the Maui County Dental Society, the Hawaii Dental Association and the American Dental Association, he has served all in many capacities, notably as President of the Hawaii Dental Association in 1973, and as recipient of its Distinguished Service Award last year. He has also served on the Hawaii State Board of Dental Examiners, and as its president

in 1964. He was on the Hawaii State Board of Health for three years (1968-71) including serving as vice-president. He was Charter Director of the Hawaii Dental Service, and founder of the Hawaii Dental Federal Credit Union as well as founder of the Hawaii Academy of General Dentistry.

Dr. Tsuji is a Fellow of both the International College of Dentists and the American College of Dentists. He has always been a loyal alumnus and was a long time member of the Eliot Society.

His community activities include among many others, the Boy Scouts, the Salvation Army, the Chamber of Commerce, and the Rotary Club to name just a few.

Fumio and his wife, Betty are the parents of two children, Ruth Leiko Sacks, a realtor, and Edward Michio Tsuji, a lawyer.

Dr. Eloy Gutierrez was born in Albuquerque, New Mexico, where he attended the local schools, graduating from Albuquerque High School in 1941. During World War II, he served as Staff Sergeant with the Aviation Engineers in the campaigns on Guam and Okinawa. After the war, he attended the University of New Mexico graduating in 1950 and Washington University School of Dentistry, graduating in 1954. He was named to Omicron Kappa Upsilon, dentistry's honorary fraternity and was also a member of Delta Sigma Delta. He has practiced dentistry in Albuquerque from 1954 until his retirement in 1988. He held membership in the Albuquerque District Dental Society, the New Mexico Dental Association and the American Dental Association. He was a member of the American Association of Dental Examiners, and served the New Mexico Dental Board as vice-president. He has served on the admissions committee of the University of New Mexico School of Dental

Hygiene. He is a long time member of the Academy of General Dentistry. He has been a loyal and active alumnus and has served the Alumni Association as a member of the Board of Directors for many years. He has been a loyal supporter of the School, for many years a member of the Eliot Society.

In his community, Dr. Gutierrez has served on the Albuquerque Library Advisory Board and as chairman of the Environmental Planning Commission for the City of Albuquerque. He has served as president of the parish school board, as well as president of the parish council; and president of the University of New Mexico Newman Center Men's Guild.

Eloy and his wife Cecelia, are the parents of three sons and three daughters and the grandparents of sixteen grandchildren. Their three sons are dentists, two are graduates of Washington University as are two of their sons-in-law. Eloy and Cecelia have indeed established a dental dynasty.

The 129th Annual Meeting

The Alumni Association met again this year together with the Greater St. Louis Dental Society's Mid-Continent Dental Congress at the Ritz-Carlton Hotel in Clayton (suburban St. Louis) Missouri on September 15-16. As has been customary in the last few years, the meeting opened with a cocktail reception at the King Center atop the Medical School Library Building at the corner of Scott and Euclid. After an extremely well-attended reception, the various classes held their reunion dinners at different locations around the city. Fifteen members of the Fifty-Year Class held a special dinner to mark the occasion. And sixteen members of the Class of 1970, twenty five years out, celebrated their silver anniversary. A large contingent of the Ten-Year Class, 1985, also threw a celebratory dinner.

Early Saturday morning, the Association's Board of Directors met at the Ritz-Carlton to conduct annual business, put forward a slate of officers and hear the reports of the Executive Committee, the

Finance Committee and the Editor. In a report from the Alumni Director, Mr. David Jolley, the good news of a sizeable bequest from an alumnus, Class of 1919, Dr. Mack Taylor, may possibly fund the Harriet Steuernagel Dental Library. Exact disposition and the correct amount of the bequest are still to be determined. Dr. Don Oliver reported for the Library Committee. After reviewing the costs of maintaining the dental periodical collection, he suggested that a committee be appointed to review the journals for quality and need as required by the dental community.

In an additional report from Mr. Jolley, it was announced that the annual A.D.A. cocktail-reception was scheduled for October 8 in Las Vegas, with two alums, Dr. Dean Sands, '82 and Dr. Sam Pick, '66 serving as local hosts. Mr. Jolley also reported that the date had been set for the first of the annual Shepard Medical Dental Lecture Series. It will be held on Wednesday, April 10, 1996 and will be presented by

Dr. Gordon E. King of Houston, Chairman of the Department of Dental Oncology at the UTMD Anderson Cancer Center. There will be C.E. accreditation for attendance at the lecture.

The 1996 meeting was discussed. It will again be held in conjunction with the Mid-Continent Dental Congress, but at a different hotel, the Regal Riverfront, in downtown St. Louis. The dates are September 19-21, 1996, with the cocktail party being held on Friday, September 20 at Alumni House out on the Main campus. Parking should be much more convenient there.

The noon luncheon-business meeting of the Association was also held at the Ritz with a quorum of loyal Alumni in attendance. A report of the meeting of the Board of Directors was given and appropriate action taken. The slate of new officers was presented and elected. They were: Dr. Don Oliver, '63, President (automatic); Dr. Pat Wilson, '73, President-elect; Dr. Eloy Gutierrez, '54, Vice-

President; Dr. Doxey Sheldon, '79, Secretary-Treasurer; and Dr. John Gilster, '44, Editor. The meeting adjourned at 2 p.m.

The annual banquet was held in a ballroom of the hotel on Saturday night, and various reunion classes were recognized, with special emphasis on the Fifty Year and Twenty Five Year classes (1945 and 1970). This year's two Distinguished Alumni, Fumio Tsuji '52 from Maui, HI and Eloy Gutierrez, '54 from Albuquerque, NM were introduced and presented with their Commemorative Plaques. Both Dr. Tsuji and Dr. Gutierrez gave gracious acceptance speeches. Dr. Tsuji's remarks (excerpted in this issue) expressed his thoughts about his dental education at Washington University and paid tribute to his wife; and Dr. Gutierrez expressed his appreciation to the school and bestowed an award (PHT - Putting Husband Through) upon his wife. After the new officers were installed, the 129th meeting of the Alumni Association came to a conclusion.

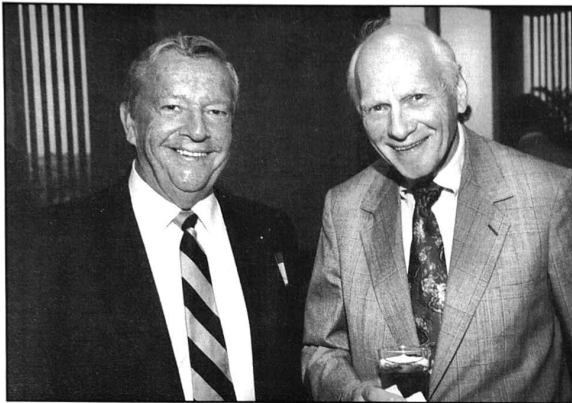


New President Don Oliver, '63, presides over the adjournment, of the meeting.

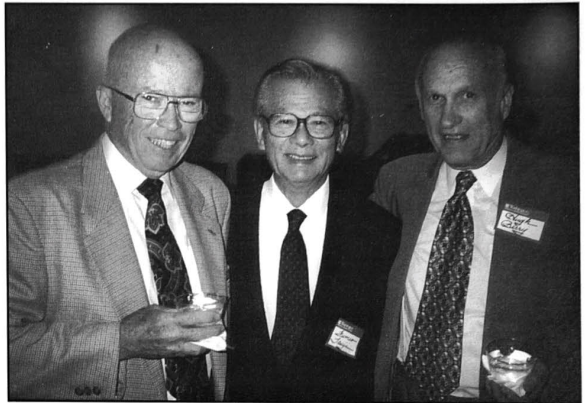

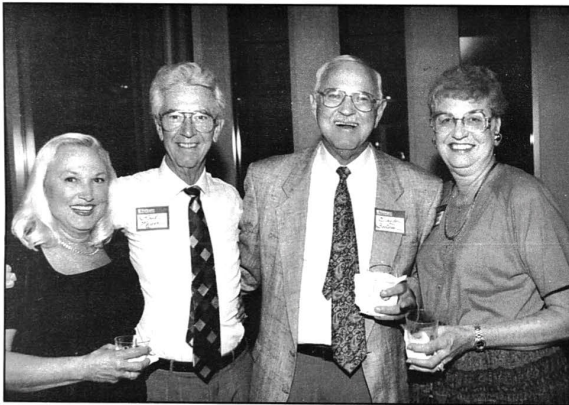

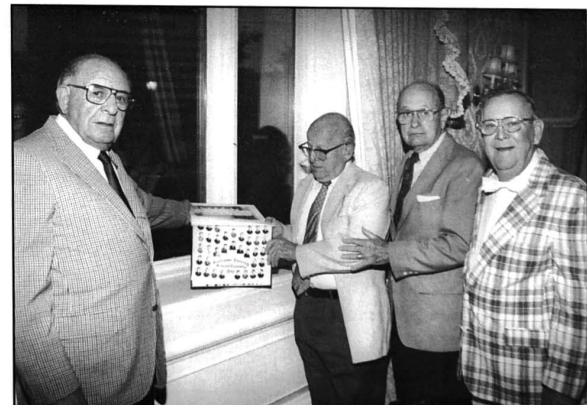

Recipient of the Greater St. Louis Dental Society's Gold Medal Award for his many contributions to the dental profession. He was honored at their inaugural dinner in January.

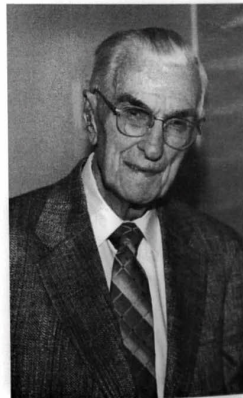

Dr. Larson Keso, '55, is Secretary-Treasurer of the American Association of Orthodontists.

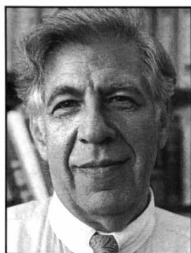

Gorlin Recipient of Ross Award



Dr. Robert Gorlin

Dr. Robert Gorlin, '47, is the 1995 recipient of the Norton M. Ross Award for Excellence in Clinical Research. The prestigious \$5000 award honors outstanding achievements in clinical investigations that have contributed to the prevention and treatment of oral diseases. It was presented at the A.D.A. Board of Trustees dinner in

Phoenix on October 2. Dr. Gorlin has been credited with discovering 75 diseases and has authored more than 500 articles and several textbooks. In the almost fifty years since his graduation from Washington University he has ranged far beyond dentistry's usual boundaries, from oral pathology through craniofacial genetics, otolaryngology and obstetrics.

Dr. Gorlin is currently Regents Professor Emeritus of Oral Pathology and Genetics at the University of Minnesota dental school, as well as holding professorships in laboratory medicine and pathology, pediatrics, dermatology, obstetrics and gynecology and otolaryngology. One of Dr. Gorlin's former students and now the professor of Oral and Maxillofacial Pathology at

Dalhousie University in Nova Scotia, Dr. M. Michael Cohen has said:

"Most of Dr. Gorlin's work has been in multiple malformation syndromes and these affect the whole body. These syndromes often will have a head and neck component but not necessarily an oral one."

Many of these diseases are heritable and so fall under the purview of medical genetics. "One of the things we have in the field of medical genetics," says Dr. Cohen, "is the McKusick Catalogue, a huge computerized data base book that numbers every genetic condition that's ever been reported.

"And of all the medical geneticists in the world who have made major contributions discovering these conditions, Bob Gorlin is the second most

heavily cited. That shows you his place."

Though he retired two years ago, Dr. Gorlin still teaches fulltime at Minnesota University dental school and continues to pursue research projects.

During his career, Dr. Gorlin also has been an editorial consultant to some 30 publications and has served as editor or associate editor to eight journals, including the Journal of Oral Pathology and Medicine and Oral Surgery, Oral Medicine, Oral Pathology.

In addition, he has held a number of offices, including the presidency of both the American Academy of Oral and Maxillofacial Pathology and the American Board of Oral and Maxillofacial Pathology.

The First Annual Shepard Dental/Otolaryngology Lecture

Earl Shepard, '31, was a loyal and generous alumnus and faculty member. He and his wife, Wilma, contributed greatly of their time and devotion to our school. When Earl died in 1991, he bequeathed a generous sum of money to his Alma Mater. Since the school of Dental Medicine was closed in 1991, the bequest was divided, with suggestions and requests from Dr. and Mrs. Shepards heirs. Besides the Steurnagel Library Fund and the Memorabilia Fund, a sizeable amount was designated to establish a lecture series in their names. Thus, on Wednesday, April 10, 1996, Dr. Gordon King, of Houston, Texas, will present the first of the Wilma and Earl Shepard Memorial Dental/Otolaryngological Lecture Series. Dr. King is a nationally known leader in maxillofacial-

prosthodontics/dental oncology. That morning he will present an hour lecture at grandrounds to the combined dental/medical faculty and later that morning, a 1 1/2 hour presentation to members of the local dental community. A mailing to alumni will specify more details on this important lecture after the first of the year.

As a recent news release stated very eloquently, "The Shepards were, for many years, associated with Washington University School of Dental Medicine where Dr. Shepard was Chairman and Professor in the Department of Orthodontics. He was a national leader in Orthodontics as well. This endowment is an extension of the kindness and generosity to the community for which the Shepards were well known."

Dr. Parsons Honored at Retirement Dinner

Family, friends and former faculty and staff members gathered at the University Club on Saturday, March 25, to recognize Dr. Patricia Parsons, '57 for her many contributions to her profession and to the School and its alumni on the occasion of her retirement from the active practice of dentistry. Many of her colleagues and friends

paid tribute to her many accomplishments and to her devoted service in teaching over 1700 dentists, and at least 45 specialists in pediatric dentistry in her career at Washington University. After graduation in 1957, she took two years training at the University of Michigan, receiving a Masters Degree in Pedodontics. She returned to St. Louis and Washington University, where she spent her entire career. She started a never-before-existing Oral Diagnosis Department and then went into the pedodontic department which she headed for twenty four years, constantly improving the curriculum and teaching methods. As one of her colleagues put it "Pat Parsons always made her goal the pursuit of excellence, and no one in dentistry has better epitomized that goal".

South of the Border to the Far East

(Excerpts from the response by Dr. Fumio Tsuji to the presentation of the Distinguished Alumni Awards)

I bring greetings from the Alumni constituent in Hawaii – and as we say it in the 50th State – A-L-O-H-A!

First of all, I want to thank the Selection Committee, and the brave nominator for making such wise and commendable choices. You have done a marvelous job! But how did you ever manage to do it?

Do you realize that one recipient has roots South of the Border and the other has roots in the Far East? That is really fantastic, unbelievable! Who would have thought that a Nissei from Maui – which is only a dot on the map – would be considered for such an award?

I want to express my thanks and appreciation to Dr. Boling and Dr. Gurley for being instrumental in letting me become a student at the Washington University Dental School. I was told that there were two thousand applicants that year.

I thank Miss Steuernagel for letting me work in the library and for the friendship she extended. Every dollar made a difference.

The person I am most indebted to is my wife, Betty. She gave up a comfortable teaching position in Hawaii to come to St. Louis – burning the bridges behind her, knowing that the St. Louis Board of Education did not recognize the credentials of the University of Hawaii Teachers College. But she persevered and gained a unique experience.

After working as a housemaid for a cardiologist in Vandeventer Place, she was accepted as a teacher at the Creve Coeur Public School. A year later, with a recommendation from the Superintendent and the Board, she took the examination and passed at the top, the St. Louis Entrance Oral and Written Tests.

She became the first ever from Hawaii to teach in St. Louis! Thereafter, teachers from Hawaii had no difficulty in getting a position in the St. Louis Public School System, while their husbands attended the medical or dental schools here. For this accomplishment, she was featured in a full page story in the Globe-Democrat.

Betty has been at my side and has given me full support for whatever I undertook all these years – 53 years. I thank her for the undaunted confidence and loyalty.*

Despite the classic protestations of the Class of '52, during my career in our profession and especially during my tenure as Chairman of the Board of Dental Examiners of the State of Hawaii, I realized that we did get quality education here.

As a graduate of Washington University Dental School, I had gained the basic tools and means to broaden my scope in dentistry. These basic skills and knowledge we gained were far superior to those of graduates of some other schools. For this I say thank you to Dean Brandhorst and the crew.

I am a member of the Pierre Fauchard Academy and Chairman of the Hawaii constituent for more than twenty years. For some reason which I do not know, I was asked to write an essay of not more than two hundred fifty words for a book called "LEGACY IN THE DENTAL PROFESSION." Many very, very notable members from the United States and foreign countries participated in order to raise funds for the PFA Foundation.

May I have your indulgence and let me share one section of my essay called "Vignettes of Attitudes and Values."

"OBLIGATION – GIRI OR ON"

**Feed a dog one day
And you will be master for
seven days
Man, too, must remember
Reciprocate he must
For in gratitude the flower
blooms**

My mater said never forget your obligations. No one makes the journey to success by himself alone.

Patients, too, are your obligations. He may be just another one of your many patients but that patient considers himself as important as anyone else; and what a difference it makes to him if he receives empathy and kindness.

In closing, I should like to say a few words to the younger members. Someone said that four walls do not a prison make. Yes, do not let the four walls of your operatory trap you and confine you. There is a big, wide world outside crying for your help. Imagine and visualize what you can do to help your community and your profession. You can use the skills you learned: Examine; Make your judgment and diagnosis; Formulate a treatment plan; Implement and complete.

Apply this procedure to any problem and save the community. You will make many people happy; you will improve the community; and it will give you a deep sense of satisfaction."

Thank you very much from the top to the bottom of my healthy heart. As they say it South of the Border, Gracias. And in Japanese, Arigato gozaimasu. We thank you and we love you.

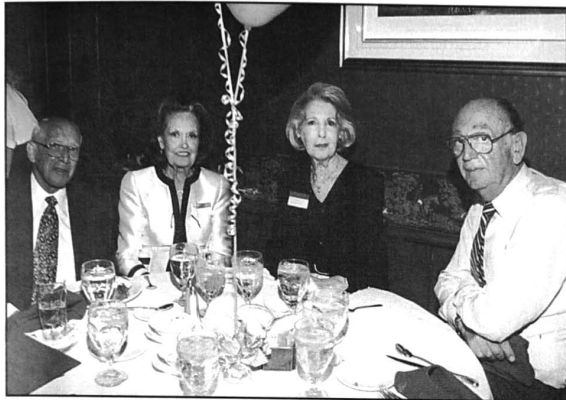
Chuck Waldron Dies

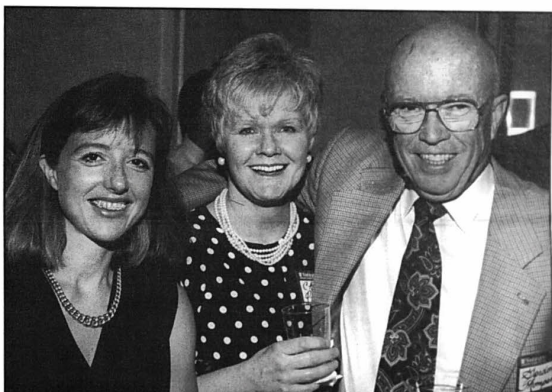
