## Dean's Message

The creative officers of your Dental Alumni Association have done several innovative things with the annual meeting and reunion in recent years. For example, the gala session two years ago in Monterey and San Francisco. And the new tie-in with the big Mid-Continent dental meeting in St. Louis. Both very successful.

This year, though, they've outdone themselves and the result is one of the most unusual annual meeting sites in the School's history. If you miss this one, you have only yourself to blame! The alumni annual meeting on September 14 has been booked into the place that has all St. Louis excitedly waiting: the brilliant new St. Louis Union Station redevelopment. And the timing of your Association couldn't be better — our meeting will take place only two weeks after the grand opening celebration of the great project... we'll be one of the first major meetings there!

I visited Union Station a few weeks ago along with your alumni officers and I can promise you that you're in for a visual, gustatory, and auditory treat! What they've done with the great old St. Louis railroad station ("they" being the Rouse Co., famous developers of Boston's Quincy Market and Baltimore's Harborplace) is nothing short of miraculous. Just wait until you see the Grand Hall, a magnificent 120 feet by 76 feet, with a barrel-vaulted ceiling that soars 65 feet above!

Our meeting will take place in the world-class Omni International Hotel, located partly in the old station building and partly in new facilities under the roof of the Shed. Adjacent is the great new retail center — 160,000 square feet of fine restaurants, informal eating places, superb specialty shops, and terraces, plazas, promenades, and a man-made lake... all within the bounds of the grand old railroad station.

Our alumni meeting again will

coincide with the Mid-Continent dental meeting so that you can combine your alumni reunion with attendance at outstanding clinical programs and see countless exhibits. The Mid-Continent meeting will be at the Chase Hotel in midtown; we'll operate a free shuttle bus (especially for our alumni) between the two hotels on Friday, September 13, and the morning of September 14.

There's no question that this is the most dramatic location for our alumni meeting in memory. We certainly hope you'll join what we anticipate to be a very large crowd of alums in St. Louis in September. You'll find more information about the meeting elsewhere in this issue and you'll soon be receiving (if you haven't already) a mailing about the meeting, which includes registration forms.

We were very gratified to receive notification from the ADA recently that the School has been restored to full accreditation status. It has been a difficult few years, what with the huge task of preparing for and then holding the accreditation inspection and then our persistent efforts to satisfy the remaining demands of the Commission on Accreditation for additional changes in our program or structure or for more information from us. Finally, though, our efforts have been crowned with success and we are relieved and grateful that the ordeal is over. It has been a team effort in the best sense: I have been given maximum assistance by many people at the School and at the University, but special thanks should be expressed to Executive Associate Dean Dave Bensinger, Associate Dean Richard Diemer, and our untiring, ever-faithful Harriett Steuernagel, all of whom spearheaded and coordinated the entire effort, which has extended over almost five years.

## Robert Bedell, '44 Distinguished Alumnus

Dr. Robert E. Bedell of the Class of 1944 has been named the recipient of the "Distinguished Alumnus Award" of the WU Dental Alumni Association for 1985. Dr. Bedell will be presented with the award at the banquet of the Association's 119th annual meeting on Saturday evening, September 14, at the Omni International Hotel in downtown St. Louis. He was selected for the award by an anonymous award committee of dental alumni.

Bob Bedell has compiled an outstanding record as a supporter of the School of Dental Medicine and also as a nationally recognized leader in his specialty of Orthodontics. He served as President of the Dental Alumni Association in 1977-1978 and as President of the Midwestern Society of Orthodontists in 1983-1984. He continues as a board member of the Dental Alumni Association and the Midwestern Society of Orthodontists.

A native St. Louisan, Bob received his D.D.S. from our School in 1944 and an M.S. degree in Orthodontics in 1951. He taught Pedodontics and general dentistry at the School from 1944 to 1951 and was a member of the Orthodontics faculty from 1958 to 1982. Although he has retired from teaching, he maintains a busy private practice in Orthodontics in suburban Kirkwood. He served from 1953-1955 as a Captain in the U.S. Army dental corps.

Bob is a member of the Capital Resources Committee for the School of Dental Medicine in the current ALLIANCE FOR WASHINGTON UNIVERSITY campaign. A member of the School's Century Club since its inception and a member of the William Greenleaf Eliot Society since 1970, Bob served in the late 1960s as Vice Chairman of the St. Louis Area Dental Alumni Division for the university's 70 by '70 fund campaign. He has served on the School's Planned Giving Committee and has represented the School on the university's Alumni



Board of Governors. He also is a current member of the School's Alumni Advisory Board.

His extraordinary service to his profession goes back to 1950 when he became Chairman of the St. Louis Dental Society Council on Dental Health. After several years on the board of the Missouri Dental Association, he served from 1970 to 1980 as Chairman of the American Association of Orthodontists Council on Public and Professional Relations. In 1979, he was the recipient of the AAO's Distinguished Service Scroll, given annually to a person who has made a substantial technical, scientific, or service contribution to Orthodontics and the AAO.

In 1982, upon his retirement from active teaching, the School's Department of Orthodontics gave Bob its Award of Merit for his long service as a member of the faculty.

He has served for many years as orthodontist for the Missouri School for the Blind.

Bob resides in West St. Louis County with his recent bride, the former Jane Kirkland, head of a well-known St. Louis travel agency. Bob is the father of a son, Thomas R. Bedell.

# Graduation 1985

The degrees were conferred on the graduating dental students at the Washington University Commencement, held outdoors in the Quadrangle. Afterwards the students and their families adjourned to The Clarion Hotel in downtown St. Louis for the School's graduation luncheon and awards program, which is cosponsored by the Dental Alumni Association. After being saluted by Dean Selfridge and Dr. Clifford G. Neill, President of the Dental Alumni Association, the students came to the platform individually to receive their diplomas, Alumni Association membership cards, and any prizes or honors they might have won. Also called up for recognition were the students completing graduate training in Orthodontics, Operative Dentistry, and Oral & Maxillofacial Surgery. The ceremony concluded as the more than 500 persons in attendance watched a U.S. Navy Dental Corps commissioning ceremony, in which seven members of the graduating class received their Navy commissions as dental officers from Commodore Robert W. Koch, an alumnus of our School who is a high-ranking career dental officer, currently stationed in Washington, D.C.

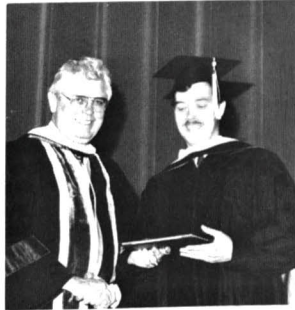

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# 119th Annual Alumni Meeting

EXCITEMENT will be the order of the day on Saturday, September 14, when the Dental Alumni Association convenes its 119th Annual Meeting. The mood of high anticipation among alumni and their spouses, families, and friends will be due in part to the natural uplift at seeing old classmates and familiar sights. But most of all, it will be due to the site of the Annual Meeting.

The alumni meeting will be one of the premiere events in St. Louis Union Station, the long-awaited, highly-touted \$135 Million development that will have its grand opening just two weeks prior to the alumni get-together. It has been tabbed by its developers as "the most exciting development going on in the country" and is expected to attract 15-Million to 20-Million tourists, shoppers, and sightseers in its first year of operation.

"We're just delighted that because of some farsighted early planning, we arranged to hold our 1985 meeting at St. Louis Union Station," commented Dr. Clifford G. Neill, Dental Alumni Association president. "We've been keeping our fingers crossed that the Union Station construction would proceed on schedule, and it has. As a result, our meeting will take place in the midst of the most discussed new attraction in St. Louis in decades."

Association meeting planners

It looms above Market Street in downtown St. Louis: a majestic gray structure that looks regally out over the Carl Milles statuary and fountains across the street. Its clock tower soars 230 feet into the sky and is visible from much of the downtown area.

This is St. Louis' famed Union Station, an architectural treasure of Bedford limestone, built in 1894 by a consortium of 22 railroads, which spared no expense to make the St. Louis terminal one of the finest in the world.

Today, the great "Headhouse," as it is properly called, is the symbol and key element of one of the nation's most exciting, eagerly-awaited urban redevelopment projects. It is called St. Louis Union Station and it includes the plush new Omni International Hotel, the site of the 1985 annual meeting of the Washington U. Dental Alumni Association.

St. Louis Union Station combines a spectacular new retail market-

emphasized that the Omni International Hotel, where alumni activities will take place, actually will open for business during the first week of August. Thus, the hotel staff will have well over a month to get the operation running smoothly before the WU dental alumni arrive. All expectations are for a flawless meeting in a location of major national interest (see separate article for more on St. Louis Union Station and the Omni International Hotel).

Alumni reunions actually will begin a day or two prior to September 14, when various individual classes have scheduled their own dinners or reunion parties. Among the classes planning get-togethers are the classes of 1935, 1940, 1945, 1955, 1960, 1965, and 1975.

Activities of the 1975 alumni meeting will be confined to a single day, Saturday, September 14, so that visiting dental graduates also can partake of the varied seminars, exhibits, and other programs at the big Mid-Continent dental meeting, which will be in progress from September 12-14. The Dental Alumni Association again has scheduled its meeting to coincide with the dates of the Mid-Continent meeting, so that alumni can enjoy all the traditional WU alumni features and, at the same time, take advantage of the diverse attractions of a major dental congress. The Mid-Continent will

be held at The Chase Hotel in midtown St. Louis. The Dental Alumni Association will provide a shuttle bus between Union Station and The Chase Hotel for the convenience of WU alumni. The tentative plan is to operate the shuttle bus from 9 A.M. to 5 P.M. on Friday, September 13, and from 9 A.M. to 12 Noon on Saturday, September 14. The bus probably will leave the Station every hour and will depart from The Chase on the half-hours for its return trip downtown. The bus is available free of charge to WU dental alumni and members of their families.

All WU dental alumni will receive a special mailing later this summer about the Mid-Continent dental meeting. The mailing will provide full information on the Mid-Continent schedule and will include a registration form.

The September 14 agenda for WU dental alumni will begin at 9 A.M. when members of the Board of Directors of the Dental Alumni Association will hold their semi-annual meeting. At Noon, all alumni and members of their families are invited to gather in the Omni International's Grand Ballroom II for the annual dental alumni luncheon. Following a brief business meeting, the luncheon program will feature the annual Report to the Alumni on the School of Dental Medicine, its prospects and progress. Dean Selfridge will be assisted in presenting the report

by the School's associate and assistant deans, each of whom will report briefly on his own area of responsibility. This reporting format was used several years ago and produced a very favorable reaction.

The same ballroom will be the location on the evening of September 14 of the traditional, festive banquet that brings the annual alumni reunion to a gala conclusion. After a lavish prime rib dinner, the banquet includes presentation of the Association's 1985 Distinguished Alumnus Award to Dr. Robert E. Bedell, '44, (see separate article), a special salute to members of the 50-year class of 1935 and the 25-year class of 1960 and the installation of the new officers of the Dental Alumni Association.

A mailing containing a pre-registration form for the alumni luncheon and banquet was sent to all WU dental alumni at the end of June. If you haven't received such a mailing and would like one or if you have any questions about the plans for the September 14 alumni meeting, please feel free to contact Irv Litvag at the School, (314) 454-0387.

Another festive event traditionally associated with the alumni annual meeting, the Century Club cocktail party, will be held from 5:30 to 7:30 P.M. on Friday, September 13, at Ellenwood Alumni House on the WU Hilltop campus.

place and a luxury hotel in a National Historic Landmark of unsurpassed beauty and elegance. The 550-room Omni International Hotel will occupy space in the restored Headhouse and in an entirely new building beneath the arching trusses of the 11.5 acre Train Shed, the largest ever built. Connecting the Headhouse and the Shed is a covered walk known as the Midway, 70 feet wide and 606 feet long. The interior of the Headhouse, a visual feast, includes Romanesque arches and columns,

vaulted ceilings, enameled tile wainscoting, sagliola walls, mosaic floors, and stained-glass windows. The hotel's main lobby is in Union Station's original Grand Hall, a magnificent room 76 feet by 120 feet with a barrel-vaulted ceiling that soars 65 feet above the floor, an allegorical stained-glass window depicting St. Louis as the Crossroads of America and elaborate plaster-relief work highlighted in gold leaf.

The hotel will offer an elegant restaurant featuring fine American cooking in Union Station's original oak-paneled Dining Hall and a more informal cafe located in gardens at the center of the Midway.

The Omni's oversized guest accommodations feature such Omni amenities as in-room movies, televisions and extra phones in bathrooms, 24-hour room service, valet parking, and concierge.

As recently as 1950, St. Louis Union Station served 13 railroads and 20,000 passengers per day. With the decline of American

passenger railroads, the last train left the great old station on October 31, 1978. Since then, this superb building had faded into obscurity. Now it has been returned to all its old glory and splendor. WU dental alumni will be among the first visitors to bid a jubilant "Welcome back!"

Jerry Young, '58, was recently elected an Associate in the American College of Prosthodontists. He has also been instrumental in organizing the **DDS Seminars** to unite the general practitioners and some of the laboratory technicians in upgrading the quality of restorative dentistry in the St. Louis Metropolitan Area. There will be a seminar on July 28-29 and one on Sept. 28. These seminars will be continued every 2 to 3 months.

Jerry has also been very active on the lecture circuit, speaking on Management of Occlusion, Crown and Bridge Dentistry, Occlusal Splint Therapy and Philosophy of Practice for the Mid-80's all over the Mid-West in the last two years.

Dr. Thomas Black, Jr. '75 continues to provide a full range of dental services for residents of Bethesda Dilworth Memorial Home in Webster Groves. His eight years of service were publicized in a recent issue of PULSE, the newsletter of Bethesda General Hospital and Homes. The article also focused on hints for improved dental health and safety in the warm summer playground months.

Dr. Paul Bozoian '82 qualified for and competed in the most recent Ironman Triathalon World Championships (Oct. 6, 1984). He placed 226th out of some 905 entrants who crossed the finish line, a feat in itself. His time was 11 hours, 52 minutes, 46 seconds. The race was composed of a 2.4 mile swim in the ocean, a 112 mile bicycle leg and finally a 26.2 mile marathon thru Hawaiian lava pits. More than 1000 top international athletes plunged into the cool 7 A.M. waters of the Pacific with many falling by the wayside as the hours wore on. Dr. Bozoian, who had taken 2 months off for training from his Bridgeton practice with father Harry and brother Steve '81, states that triathalons "are part fitness, but definitely more mind control. One must push himself or herself extremely hard mentally just to finish, let alone win." Dr. Bozoian feels that all dentists should start or maintain a fitness program for themselves and their staffs, but hedges on whether he will be drawn to compete again in this year's triathalon.

This addition will give us about 8,000 square feet of additional space on five levels and will provide new homes for our Learning Resources Center and Department of Maxillofacial Prosthetics, along with more space for faculty offices, biomedical science, and student lectures. Construction has been delayed a bit by the appearance of some unexpected underground pipes which required hand digging, but we hope for final completion by December or January.

We're spending \$650,000 on the new addition and we hope this decision will be perceived as what it is: a strong statement of our optimism about the School's future. I constantly am bedeviled by rumors that the School is in deep financial trouble, is planning to close, etc., etc. If you hear such rumors, just point out to the other person what should be obvious: we wouldn't have committed such funds to new construction if we harbored the slightest doubts about the School's future potential.

Having made that clear, we must in honesty add that our finances are tight right now. We must budget very carefully and we must do everything possible to maximize our income. We're not alone in this; almost every dental school, and especially the private ones, is having similar concerns. The reasons are obvious. Our enrollment is declining because the present dental manpower situation requires a slowdown in producing new dentists and, more significantly, because the number of national applicants to dental schools has dropped almost by half in recent years. This means a drop in our tuition income and a drop in clinic income, what with fewer students in the clinic.

We see signs that the national fall in dental applications is leveling out. And projections are that the need for new dentists will soon begin increasing. We think we'll enroll a Freshman class of 60 this fall (selected from 800 applicants) and we look for a further drop to a class-size of 58 in the next year or two, but we don't expect any additional decline.

We have planned carefully for

this tight financial period and we are weathering it well. But, more than ever, we rely on the financial help of our alumni to carry us through. We certainly encourage you to make your annual contributions to the Alumni Annual Giving Fund. If you have made a pledge when contacted through one of our alumni phonathons, please pay the amount you pledged. We are troubled by an unusually large number of individuals who have not yet paid their pledges, and thus our fund-raising record for the year is not as good as it should be. If those who have pledged will pay as soon as possible, our School again will rank at or near the top of all alumni divisions of Washington University.

There have been two major administrative changes at the School that you should know about. Dick Brand, who succeeded Bob Ring a couple of years ago as Director of Admissions and also teaches a full schedule of Anatomy classes, has been named Assistant Dean for Student Affairs. In this post, Dick supervises Admissions, the Registrar's Office, Financial Aids, Student Counseling, and Career Counseling. Certainly, enough to guarantee that Dick will be as busy as ever!

The other change involves the establishment of a large new Department of Restorative Dentistry that encompasses the former departments of Operative Dentistry, Fixed Prosthodontics, Removable Prosthodontics, and Conjoint Dental Sciences. This change will help us to use the faculty and support staff of those departments in a more cost-effective way, will promote greater interchange and cross-teaching among the faculty members, and will free some badly-needed student time by eliminating certain redundancies in lectures and labs.

To head the new department, we have persuaded an old friend to come home: Dr. R. J. (Jim) McCune of our Class of 1960, who has spent the past 13 years in New Jersey as an executive with the Johnson & Johnson Dental Products Co. Jim is a highly respected figure in Restorative Dentistry and we know he will provide the finest type of leadership. We feel his acquisition is a real coup for the School.

If you loved Leroy Boling as everyone here did, I hope you have contributed or plan to contribute to the Leroy Boling Memorial Student Loan Fund. Dean Boling had a great love for our students and he

worried deeply in his last years, along with Bob Ring, Dick Brand, Dave Bensinger, and myself, over the increasing financial pressures faced by the students, particularly as the federal government began steadily reducing its support for higher education scholarships and loans.

We have established the student loan fund in Dean Boling's memory because we knew that is what he would have wanted. He would be delighted to know (and I think he does know) that his name is being used to help the students he cared so much about. In the last few weeks, alumni and other friends of Dean Boling have contributed over \$25,000 to this fund. Just to let you know where we stand... we now have more than \$600,000 in our student loan and scholarship funds. In order to truly meet the present needs of our students, it is vital that we bring this total up to a million dollars! Please do your part by making a special gift to the Boling Memorial Student Loan Fund. He would be pleased.

I'm awaiting with excitement the opening of St. Louis Union Station and our big September get-together there. I certainly hope I'll have the chance to greet you then and to welcome you back to your School.

Miss Steuernagel was presented with the plaque by Dr. W. Neal Newton, an alumnus of our School, who is ICD Regent for the Sixth District.

## Jim McCune, '60 New Restorative Department Head



Dr. Robert J. (Jim) McCune, a 1960 graduate of our School, has been appointed Chairperson of the new Department of Restorative Dentistry, effective July 1, 1985. The new department will represent a merger of the present departments of Fixed and Removable Prosthodontics, Operative Dentistry, and Conjoint Dental Sciences.

Dr. McCune, who also holds a master's degree from the Indiana University School of Dentistry, has been an executive with the Johnson & Johnson Dental Products Company in New Jersey for the past 13 years. He began there as Director of Clinical Dental Research, was promoted to Vice-President for Research & Development, and has served for the past five and a half years as Vice-President, Professional Relations. After his graduation here, Dr. McCune served as a dentist with the U.S. Public Health Service and at the National Institutes of Health before entering the dental corps of the U.S. Coast Guard, in which he served for three years. In 1964, he joined the staff of the Dental Materials and Technology Program at the Dental Health Center in San Francisco and, after time out to do his postgraduate work at Indiana University, he continued at the Dental Health Center until 1971, serving as Assistant Chief and later Chief of the Materials and Technology Branch. In 1971, he joined the staff of the National Institutes of Dental Research in Bethesda, Md. and then moved a year later to Johnson & Johnson.

Dr. McCune, a native of Montana, is married and the father of a

daughter and three sons. He is a past president of the ADA's Alumni Association of Student Clinicians, an organization composed of dentists who, during their student years, presented table clinics at the annual sessions of the ADA. He has been a trustee of the American Fund for Dental Health since 1980. Dr. McCune has been a faculty member at the Indiana University School of Dentistry, the University of California at San Francisco School of Dentistry, and the University of the Pacific School of Dentistry. He has written or co-written papers presented at many major dental meetings and is the author or co-author of numerous articles on composite resins, pit and fissure sealants, and other topics that have been published in such journals as the *Journal of the American Dental Association*, *The Journal of Prosthetic Dentistry*, and the *Journal of Preventive Dentistry*.

## Gunter Schmidt Honored

Dr. Gunter Schmidt, '37, has been named as one of two recipients of the Missouri Dental Association's 1985 "Distinguished Service Award."

The award was presented April 25 during the Association's 120th annual session in Kansas City. Dr. Carl Sawyer of Kansas City was named as the other recipient.

The "Distinguished Service Award" is meant to recognize persons who have given many years of dedicated service to the dental profession in Missouri.

Dr. Schmidt has served Missouri dentistry in many capacities, but he is most widely recognized for his tireless work in the legislative arena. As chairman of the MDA Council on Legislation from 1969-1984, Dr. Schmidt spent many hours monitoring legislation and driving to Jefferson City to testify before various committees.

He was born in Nuremberg, Germany, and came to St. Louis in 1933 to attend the Washington University School of Dental Medicine. He served with the U.S. Army Dental Corps from 1943-1946 in the South Pacific.

Dr. Schmidt has been active in organized dentistry, holding many offices in the Greater St. Louis Dental Society and serving on many state and local committees.

He was recently honored also with the Gold Medal Award of the Greater St. Louis Dental Society.

He is a past president of the American Society for Geriatric Dentistry and the American Academy of Oral Medicine, and is the current national secretary of the latter organization. In addition, he is the senior staff dentist at Jewish Hospital in St. Louis, and the first chairman, dental division, of the St. Louis Arts and Education Fund.

Dr. Schmidt practices at 225 S. Meramec Ave. in St. Louis. He and his wife, Corinne, have two children.

## Barney Brooks Retires

After 56 years as a dentist and an educator, Dr. E. C. Brooks, '29, has hung up his handpiece and laid down his wax carver.

Graduating from Washington University School of Dentistry near the top of his 1929 class, Dr. Brooks began teaching at the dental school. First he taught full denture prosthetics, then a combination of partial denture prosthetics and crown and bridge. Finally, in the late 1940's, he joined the newly-formed department of crown and bridge dentistry where he continued until his retirement from teaching in the mid 1960's. Although he taught only half time at the dental school, there were two periods when he was the acting chairperson of the crown and bridge department. As an accomplished clinician who did his own laboratory work, Dr. Brooks not only could tell the students how to do crown and bridge, but could effectively demonstrate as well. Consequently, Dr. Brooks is fondly remembered as one who demanded high standards of his students without losing their respect and admiration.

Although Dr. Brooks began his practice during the depression, he did not allow financial factors to alter the quality of his services. Practicing first in the city of St. Louis and later in Clayton, he attracted patients who "wanted it done right." As part of what might be called a "dying breed," Dr. Brooks was an excellent gold foil operator and an expert with conservative castings, such as pin-bridges, 3/4 crowns, overlays and inlays—the latter often done with the direct pattern technique. He was also among the first in St. Louis to use the fully-adjustable articulator for complete mouth rehabilitation. Consequently, he has been an inspiration to all who

believe that a dentist does not have to compromise his principles to make a good living in dentistry.

As if his contribution to dentistry as an educator and able practitioner were not enough, Dr. Brooks served in various capacities for the old Central District Dental Society, the Greater St. Louis Dental Society and the Missouri Dental Association. His devotion to organized dentistry culminated in his serving in 1962 as president of the Greater St. Louis Dental Society.

While Dr. Brooks was not a prolific writer or a well-traveled lecturer, he was widely recognized by his crown and bridge peers. In the 1950's, he was one of the founding fathers and charter members of the American Academy of Crown and Bridge Prosthodontics, an organization which has grown a hundredfold to become the major force in the field of crown and bridge.

Dr. Brooks and Hazel Mayfield were married 54 years ago. They have one daughter and two granddaughters. They will continue to live in St. Louis county and commute often to their Ozark country place.

This short profile on Dr. Brooks, who has accomplished so much, only highlights his career. Nevertheless, we cannot let Dr. Brooks slip into retirement without some measure of recognition for his myriad contributions to dentistry. Speaking for many in dentistry he has touched, may I say, "Thanks, Barney, people like you make it all worthwhile."

## School Accredited

Dean Selfridge was notified on May 20 by the Commission on Dental Accreditation of the American Dental Association that our School has been granted FULL Accreditation which will run until 1992, when another accreditation inspection of the School will take place.

The Dean also was notified by the Commission on Dental Accreditation that its most recent Annual Survey of our Advanced Oral & Maxillofacial Surgery training program "has met the minimum requirements for its authorized enrollment in all categories specified in the *Essentials of an Advanced Educational Program in Oral and Maxillofacial Surgery* during this reporting period."

## Alumni Directory

Reaction to the new Washington U. Dental Alumni Directory, which was mailed this spring to all School alumni by the Dental Alumni Association, has been overwhelmingly favorable. A number of alumni have written or called the School to express their thanks for the Directory, the first issued by the Association since 1977. The book, which was coordinated by Irv Litvag, executive secretary of the Dental Alumni Association, contains alumni listings arranged alphabetically, by class, and geographically. It also includes membership lists of the alumni giving clubs, the Association officers and board of directors, School telephone numbers, and other useful information.

School alumni were asked to make voluntary contributions to pay the cost of producing the Directory. As of May 31, a total of 295 alumni had made contributions totaling \$5366. This falls well short of the total production cost of approximately \$8600 for the Directory and will require the Dental Alumni Association to make up the difference from its treasury. This, in turn, may force a reduction of some Association activities during the coming year due to lack of sufficient funds.

Officers of the Association, while seriously disappointed that the financial response from alumni was not greater, expressed their deep appreciation to those who did contribute.

"Individual contributions for the Directory ranged as high as \$100," noted Dr. Joseph H. Laffler, Secretary-Treasurer of the Association, "and many of the contributors made gifts in excess of the suggested amount of \$15. Our sincere thanks go to each and every alumnus or alumna who contributed, regardless of the amount given. We are not sending out individual acknowledgements of the contributions in order to save the expense of so doing, but we hope the contributors will accept this expression of our appreciation for their support."

One of the most heartwarming contributions was received from Mrs. Catherine Harrison of Idaho Falls, Idaho, the widow of Dr. Robert Harrison of the Class of 1951, who died last January following a tragic accident in which carbon monoxide escaped from the furnace in the family home. In the note accompanying

her check, Mrs. Harrison wrote: "I'm sure he would want to make a contribution to the Alumni Directory. He really enjoyed the profession of Dentistry. Enclosed is our contribution."

Among others who contributed were Chancellor William H. Danforth of Washington University and Mr. George H. Capps, a member of the University's Board of Trustees.

## Two Alumni Elected

Dr. Steve Montgomery, Washington University School of Dental Medicine ('59), was recently elected editor of the American Association of Endodontists. He was elected April 27 during the Association's 42nd annual session in San Diego, California.

And Dr. John B. Holcomb, also an alumnus ('61), was elected a trustee of the American Association of Endodontists' Endowment and Memorial Foundation. The Foundation is a Chicago-based charitable organization that provides grants for student loans and endodontic research.

In his new position, Dr. Montgomery will serve as editor of the **Journal of Endodontics**, which is sponsored by the Association.

In addition to his current teaching post as associate professor of endodontics at the University of Texas Health Sciences Center (San Antonio), he has held a variety of positions in the US Navy Dental Corps including chairman of the Department of Endodontics and director of the Residency Program in Endodontics, both at the National Naval Dental Center, Bethesda, MD.

Dr. Montgomery is a member of the American Association of Dental Research, American Association of Dental Schools, Texas State Dental Association, San Antonio Dental Society and the American Dental Association.

His honors include the Armed Forces Expeditionary Medal, two letters of commendation, the National Defense Medal, Cum Laude status in Omicron Kappa Upsilon, and Diplomate status in

He and his wife, Beverly, have four children.

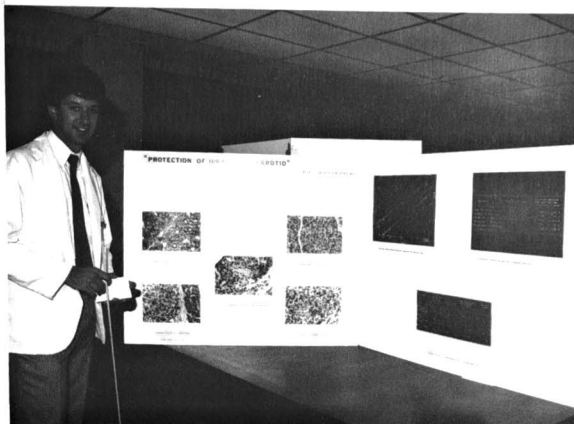

## An Editor In Our Midst

The December 1984 issue of *Dentistry* 84, the quarterly magazine of the American Student Dental Association, was filled with editorial contributions from our students and recent graduates of our School. The instigator of this efflorescence of student creativity is Bill Hartel of our Senior Class, who is Editor-in-Chief of all ASDA publications. Among the featured articles in *Dentistry* 84 was one written by Sarah Douglas of the Junior Class on "Tooth Cleaning With Plants." The article described the use of chewing sticks — "nature's own toothbrush" — by one-quarter of the world's population. The article included a number of quotes from Dr. Memory Elvin-Lewis, head of the Section of Microbiology, who, with her husband, Dr. Walter Lewis, WU medicinal botanist, has conducted studies throughout the world on chewing sticks. They are considered the leading authorities on the subject. The article describes the various materials and teeth-cleaning methods used in different parts of the world.

An article on "Dentistry in Haiti" was written for *Dentistry* 84 by Dr. John Bryan of our Class of 1981 and describes his experiences

in providing dental treatment for Haitians during his senior year here, when he traveled to Haiti as part of a missionary team. The centerfold of *Dentistry* 84 is a 1985 calendar with the headline "Ski Dentistry" and a big photo of Chris Mjelde of the Senior Class skiing out of a dentist's chair (if that sounds a bit strange, see the photo for yourself.) The centerfold calendar contains a note that it was copyrighted by Bill Hartel, Art Hess, and Chris. The magazine also carries articles for patient education purposes on endodontics and periodontal disease and both feature illustrations by Ron Hurley of the Senior Class. In the magazine's Science Section is a case report by Charles Lyon, also of the Senior Class, on "The Forensic Dentist as Principal Accident Investigator."

Speaking of Bill Hartel, his outstanding article on "Dentistry in Space," which originally was published in a past issue of *Dentistry* 84, was recently reprinted in *Zahnärztliche Mitteilungen*, the journal of the West German Dental Society. The cover of the magazine, promoting Bill's article, featured an unusual color photo of a weightless astronaut being given a dental examination.

## Editorial

For some time I have thought there should be a clarification of the difference between the dues which the Washington University Dental Alumni Association collects each year and the contributions to the School which are solicited by various alumni through the University Alumni Office.

The dues are \$20 per year and are billed to you by letter from the President of the Association in November each year. These dues are used to fund activities of the Alumni Association — the Newsletter, the annual meeting and various social activities like the luncheon to honor the new graduates each year. On the other hand, gifts to the School are solicited by letters from interested alumni, through phone calls from alumni and, even students. Often these gifts to the School are designated as Club memberships, depending on the amount of the donation. Specifically, donors of \$100 to \$249 are Century Club members; donors of \$250 to \$499 are members of the Boling Associates; donors of \$500 to \$999 are Dean's Committee members; and donors of \$1000 and up are Eliot Society members. Gifts thus donated to the University go

directly to the School to help fund its program of dental education.

The two fund solicitations are totally separate and it should be clear that paying your alumni dues does not constitute a donation to the School, except indirectly as the activities of the Association benefit the School.

And, on the other hand, donations to the School through the Annual Giving program do not pay your dues to the Alumni Association.

There are, of course, other Fund solicitations: Tribute Fund, Boling Memorial Fund, various student loan funds, all of which are really closely related to Annual Giving; and the Directory solicitation (to defray costs of publishing the Directory) which is separate from both other fund solicitations.

The ideal Alumnus would pay his Association dues each year, give a donation this year to help pay for the Directory, and give his contribution to the School through the Annual Giving Program. Giving to the level of membership in one of the Giving Clubs (Century Club, etc.) is not necessary for all Alumni. Any gift to the School is deeply appreciated, regardless of the amount.

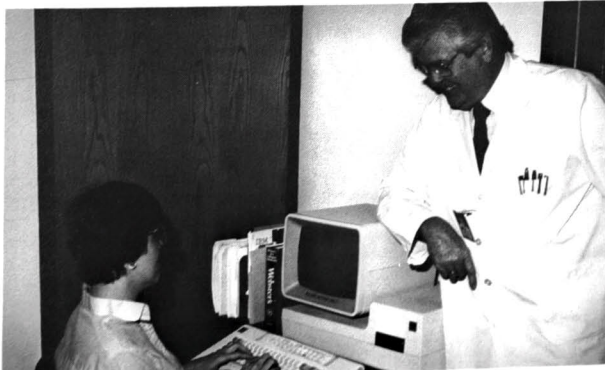

## Oncology Dental Clinic

The formation of an Oncology Dental Support Clinic to provide treatment for patients receiving or anticipating radiation treatment to the head and neck area has been announced by the Washington University School of Dental Medicine.

The new service will be operated in conjunction with the School's Departments of Diagnostic Services and Maxillofacial Prosthetics and will be supervised by Dr. Michael ShROUT, Instructor of Oral Diagnosis & Radiology at the School of Dental Medicine.

In announcing establishment of the new dental service, Dean George D. Selfridge said that the service is intended primarily for patients who do not presently have a private dentist treating them or for those who are in St. Louis to

receive medical treatment and whose own dentists are not available.

Faculty members of the School of Dental Medicine will provide all phases of dental treatment for such patients, including checkups, cleaning, amalgam restorations, periodontal and endodontic therapy. Prosthetic and prosthodontic services, when needed, will be provided by the School's Department of Maxillofacial Prosthetics. Patients preparing for radiation treatment to the head and neck area can receive a pre-radiation dental exam at the School of Dental Medicine or in a hospital.

## New Addition To School Building

A five-story addition to the Washington University School of Dental Medicine, 4559 Scott Ave., at the Washington University Medical Center, is now under construction, it has been announced by Dean George D. Selfridge. The addition, costing \$650,000, is expected to be ready for use in early 1986.

According to David A. Bensing, executive associate dean, who is supervising the project, the addition will provide nearly 8,000 square feet of space on the five levels. The construction is taking place in an inner courtyard of the present school building, and also involves the extension of a previously recessed section of the building out to the main building line along Scott Avenue.

The new facility will make possible the transfer of the school's Learning Resources Center, where students use audio-visual equip-

ment to study course materials, to a location adjacent to the school library. Other changes will include the addition of offices for clinical faculty members, the transfer of the Department of Maxillofacial Prosthetics to more suitable space, the creation of a clinic management office area, two floors of additional space for biomedical research, and a small lecture room that can be divided into two conference rooms.

The Hoffmann Partnership is architect for the addition and the construction is being done by the Tarlton Corp.

The School of Dental Medicine consists of two connecting buildings: the main building completed in 1928 and totally refurbished in 1972, and the Carlyn H. Wohl Research Center, dedicated in 1961. A four-story addition to the main building was completed in 1975.

If this is so, and we don't doubt the research, why do the British have such a great incidence of caries when they are such great consumers of tea? Perhaps it is because they are also

such great consumers of candy and sugar."

... Congratulations to Drs. Rebecca German and Philip Osdoby of the Biomedical Sciences area on being named recipients of major grants. Dr. German received a three-year, \$105,000 New Investigator Award from the National Institute for Dental Research for her research on the coordination of the jaws, tongue, hyoid bone, and muscles of mastication in feeding behavior.

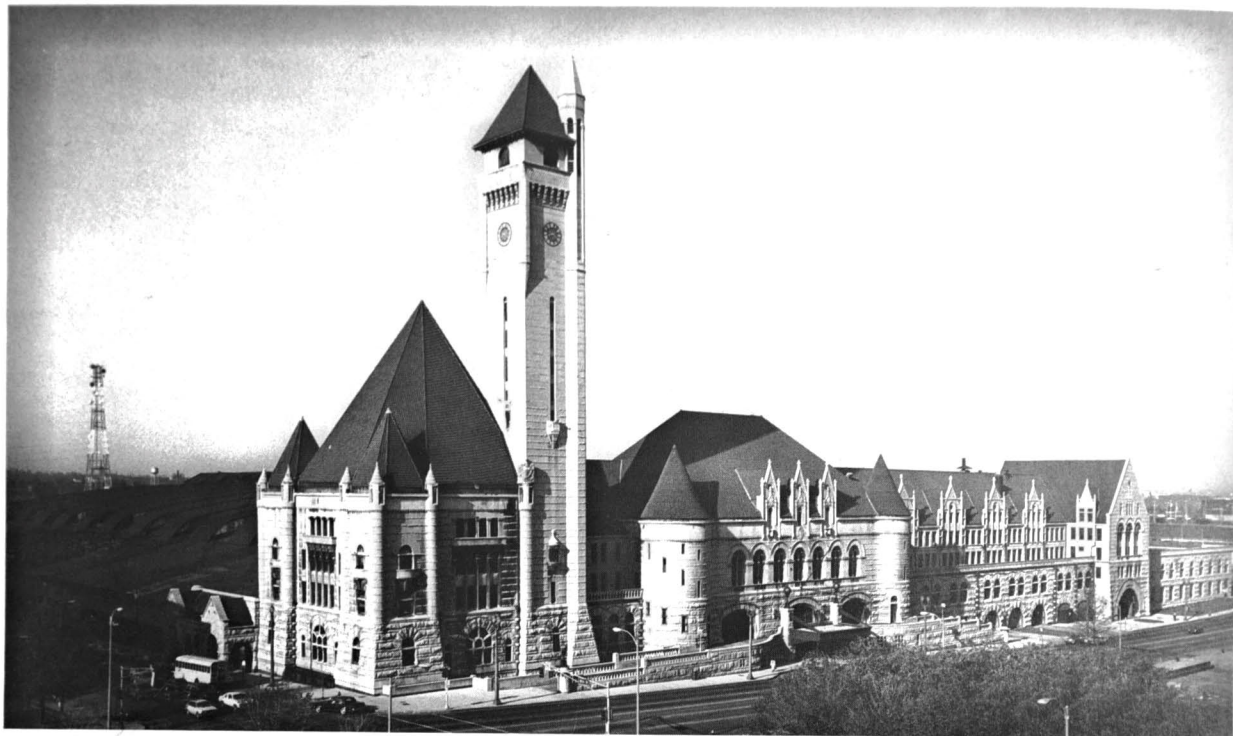
