

Robert Gorlin

Robert Gorlin '47 longtime educator and international authority on Oral Pathology, was honored by the Alumni Association at its annual banquet on Saturday, September 20, 1997, at the

Riverfront Hotel Regal St. Louis.

The award is presented each year during the annual meeting of the Association to an alumnus of the School who has distinguished himself (or herself) through contributions to the dental profession. The award recognizes Dr. Gorlin's long and outstanding career in dental education.

Besides his dental degree, Dr. Gorlin holds a Master of Science Degree (Chemistry) and two Honorary Doctorates in Science from Universities in Greece (Athens and Thessalonica).

Dr. Gorlin has held joint appointments with the University of Minnesota Schools of Dentistry and Medicine as Professor of Pathology, Dermatology, Pediatrics, Obstetrics, Gynecology, and Otolaryngology. He has also served as president of The International Association for

Dental Research (1959), American Academy of Oral Pathology (1966-67), and The International Society Craniofacial Biology (1969-70). In addition, Dr. Gorlin served for thirty years as Editor of Oral Pathology of the prestigious Journal of Oral Surgery, Oral Medicine and Oral Pathology.

His 55 page curriculum vitae lists many more honors, including authorship of some 547 articles, chapters, books and motion pictures.

He was also named by our own University as a Founders Day Distinguished Alumnus in 1974.

Robert J. Gorlin has contributed, and still contributes, greatly to our profession and is an example of the very finest in dentistry. Washington University Dental Alumni Association is proud to name him Distinguished Alumnus of 1997.

The 131st Annual Meeting

The Washington Univer-Dental Alumni sitv Association held its annual meeting in conjunction with the Greater St. Louis Mid-Continent Society's Dental Congress at the Regal Riverfront Hotel on September 19 and 20, 1997. This was the first year that the meeting was held at the Regal Riverfront (formerly Stouffer's) which is located just west of the Arch This location allowed those in attendance to have a spectacular view of the Arch and surrounding national park.

The cocktail party and reception was held Friday evening at the Alumni House on the Main Campus. After a very wellattended reception, the various classes held their reunion dinners at different locations around the city. The Fifty Year Class held a dinner-reunion for the 14 members present to mark the occasion. The Ten Year Class was also well represented and they gathered for a special celebration, also.

On Saturday morning, the Association's Board of Directors met at the Regal Riverfront to conduct annual business and put forward a slate of officers for the upcoming year. Reports by the Executive Committee, the Finance Committee and the Editor were heard.

The Directory Committee report was given by Dr. Gail Holcomb. The Dental Alumni Directory was to have been mailed to all alumni during the fall of 1997, but the company in charge of the publication failed to make a complete mailing to all alumni so that all information could be updated. The company is now in the process of reviewing and completing that mailing. Publication and distribution should occur in late 1997 or early 1998. This directory will be mailed at no charge to all alumni. It is paid for by our Alumni dues, a portion of which is budgeted each year to go into the directory budget so that a new and updated version can be distributed every five years. The new directory will contain e-mail and fax numbers which will make it even easier to keep in touch with classmates and friends.

The Alumni Development Report was given by Dr. Pat Wilson. This report included the status of the Harriet Steuernagel Library Fund and the Shepard Lecture Series Fund (please see the separate article in this newsletter for date and location of the 1998 lecture).

The 1998 meeting will again be held to coincide with the Mid-Continent which will be held at the Regal Riverfront Hotel on September 18 & 19, 1998.

The noon luncheonbusiness meeting of the Alumni Association was also held at the Regal Riverfront with a quorum of loyal alumni present, including numerous members of the Fifty Year Class. 

Man's Job Takes Bite From Boredom

Jim McGivney, '75 did not join the Navy to see the world, but years later, it seems to have worked out that way.

Last month, for instance, he went to Guam. A couple of years ago, he went to Mexico. A couple of years before that, he went to Hong Kong.

All because of the Navy, at least indirectly.

In the late '60s, McGivney did a hitch in the Marine Corps. He was a rifleman, and served in Vietnam.

When he got out, he decided to become a dentist. The Navy had a program in which it would pay for dental school if the new dentist would then serve in the Navy. McGivney enrolled in the program and graduated from the Washington University School of Dental Medicine in December 1975. Had the Navy given him an assignment and a duty station right then and there. McGivney would have become exactly what he wanted to be - a regular dentist.

But the Navy didn't have a slot for him until May. Looking for something to do between December and May, McGivney took a couple of courses in advanced pathology.

He got to know the people in the local forensic medicine community.

When he got out of the Navy in 1979 - he spent his entire hitch in San Diego – he became the forensic dentist for the St. Louis area. In addition to practicing dentistry at his Affton office and at St. Louis University, McGivney is the fellow who uses dental records to determine the identities of bodies. He handles bitemark cases.

A few years ago, when an oil-drilling ship went down in a typhoon in the South China Sea, the company that owned the ship wanted to identify the remains of its crew. The father of one of the officers of the company was a physician and had heard McGivney lecture. So the company hired McGivney.

Many of the crew members had no dental records. Instead, McGivney was given photographs and had to match the photographs with skulls. He spent two months in Hong Kong.

A couple of years later, a Mexican diplomat was murdered in this country. After his body was taken to Mexico and buried, authorities arrested a man and discovered a bite mark on his chest. Had the diplomat bitten his killer during a struggle?

McGivney accompanied some FBI agents to Mexico where the body of the diplomat was exhumed. The dentist prepared a cast of the diplomat's teeth and later compared them to the bite mark on the suspect. It was a

match, and the suspect pleaded guilty.

Last month, McGivney went to Guam to help identify the bodies of 225 people killed when the Korean Air jetliner crashed there.

The authorities thought of him, he said, because of the work he had done in November when two planes collided on the runway in Quincy, Ill. McGivney heard about that crash on the radio and called the coroner's office to see if it needed any help. It did, so McGivney drove to Quincy.

"It was the perfect situation for dental identification." McGivney said. "The bodies had been burned so they couldn't use fingerprints, and all the people were local, so dental records were readily available. There was another forensic dentist there from Chicago, and we got the bodies identified right away."

So when the disaster Guam occurred. McGivney was one of seven dentists sent to Guam. The dentists, incidentally, were part of a team of more than 100 people who were sent as part of the government's Disaster Mortuary Services. In addition to identifying the bodies and determining the causes of death - especially important regarding the cockpit crew because of possible implications concerning the reason for the crash -

the team embalmed the bodies and prepared them for shipment.

The FBI had fingerprint teams. There were pathologists to determine the causes of death. Dentists and anthropologists assisted in identifying bodies that could not be identified through fingerprints.

There were also a number of morticians to do the embalming work.

"We worked 12-hour days," said McGivney. "It was hard work, especially regarding the dental identifications. For some reason, dental X-rays are not very common in Korea."

In 10 days of work, the dentists successfully identified 15 of the bodies.

During the work, one of the morticians had a heart attack and died.

"His colleagues had him done up and embalmed almost immediately. We had a memorial service for him within a couple of hours." McGivney said.

Despite the long hours and gruesome nature of the work, it was interesting to be part of such a large, well-functioning team, McGivney said.

"There was a lot of camaraderie. It was almost like being in the military again, but for only 10 days."

With another exception, too. In his new role, he gets to see the world.


Everybody had a great time during their stay in St. Louis. The next class reunion is in 2002. It will be

Harriett Steuernagel Dies

Beloved librarian Harriett Steuernagel, who served the dental school for over fifty years, died November 11, 1997 at the age of ninety. She had joined the staff in 1946 and officially retired in 1981; but she continued her stewardship of the dental school library, which was named for her in 1988. She worked for her beloved library until shortly before her death.

Born in Jackson, MS on May 23, 1907, she attended Stephens College where she earned an A.A. degree in 1929. She received her B.A. in English from Washington University in 1932 and a BSLS (Library Science) at the University of Illinois in 1937. It was not common knowledge, but she early pursued a career in ballet and had danced at the St. Louis Muny Opera and was one of the original Rockettes.

Even after she "retired" and became Librarian and Associate Professor Emeritus in 1981, she just wouldn't quit and rest on her laurels. She served as a Consultant in Dental Education, earning the deepest gratitude from the students for her efforts in auiding them through the rocky seas in their pursuit of Graduate Education. The Class of 1986 presented her with a Certificate of Honor, in recognition of her service to them. She

received the Award of Appreciation from the Missouri Section of the International College of Dentists in 1985. She also received the Special Libraries Association Honor on her retirement in 1981.

In addition to her responsibilities as librarian at the dental school. she held many committee appointments and offices in the Special Libraries Association. Medical Library Association, and the American Association of Dental Schools (AADS), She headed the AADS committee on Standards for Dental School Libraries for several years.

Harriett will long be remembered by her many friends on the faculty and by the hundreds of dental graduates of our School for her devotion to the School and dentistry.
