Arthur Miller Named 1998 Distinguished Alumnus

Washington University Dental Alumni Association is pleased to name Dr. Arthur S. Miller, Class of 1959, as the Distinguished Alumnus for 1998. He is being recognized for his many contributions to dentistry in general and to Oral and Maxillofacial Pathology in particular.

Dr. Miller was honored by the Alumni Association at its annual banquet on Saturday, September 19, 1998 at the Frontenac Hilton Hotel in St. Louis.

The award is presented each year during the annual meeting of the Association to an alumnus of the School who has distinguished himself (or herself) through contributions to the dental profession. The award this year recognizes Dr. Miller's

long outstanding career in dental education.

Dr. Miller attended Montana State University where he received his Bachelor of Science degree in 1955. He entered Washington University School of Dentistry that autumn and graduated in 1959. Following two years in the Navy, Dr. Miller pursued a graduate degree in Oral Pathology at Indiana University under Dr. William G. Shafer. After earning his Master of Science Degree in 1963, he remained at Indiana University as an instructor in the Department of Oral Pathology until 1966. His next post, at Temple University was where he spent the rest of his career, rising from Assistant Professor in

1966 to Professor and Chairman of the Department of Pathology at the School of Dentistry (1972-1986). From 1986 until his recent retirement (July, 1997) his title was Professor of Pathology, Temple University School of Medicine and Section Chief, Oral Pathology. He is now Emeritus Professor of Pathology. While on the faculty at Temple, he was elected in 1968 to the Presidency of the Collegial Assembly. He received the Lindback Award for Distinguished Teaching in 1979. Dr. Miller served as a member of Temple University's Faculty Senate from the School of Medicine, 1995-1997, is on the staff of Temple University Hospital and is

Adjunct Professor of Biomedical Engineering at Drexel University.

Dr. Miller is regarded, both nationally and internationally, as an eminent Oral Pathologist. For many years he served as the Director of Education and then as Secretary-Treasurer of the American Academy of Oral and Maxillofacial Pathology. In 1988 he became President of that Academy.

He has coauthored two textbooks, contributed several chapters to others and published over 95 papers in the field of Oral Pathology.

The Association is honored to name Arthur Miller, '59 as the Distinguished Alumnus of 1998.

Shepard Memorial Lecture

The 4th annual Shepard Otolaryngology Memorial Lecture will be given on April 14, 1999. The speaker is scheduled to be Dr. Jack Dale, an internationally known orthodontist from Toronto, Canada. Dr. Dale received his D.D.S. degree from Toronto University, his post-graduate work in

orthodontics was done at Harvard.

The lecture will be given at the Newman Center of the Medical School. At the time of publication of this newsletter, Dr. Dale had not notified the organizers of the topic of his presentation, therefore, final times of the talk have not been announced.

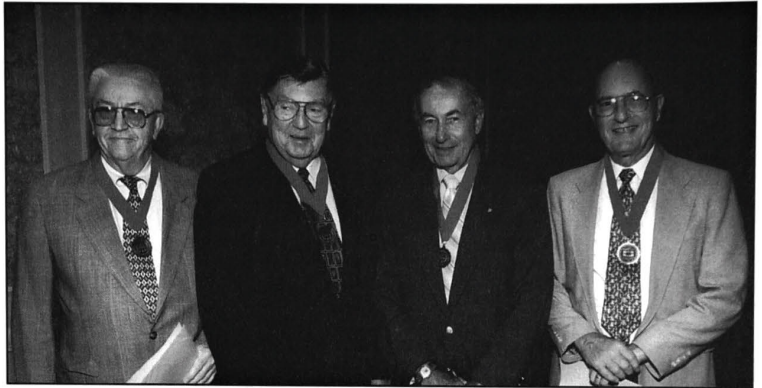

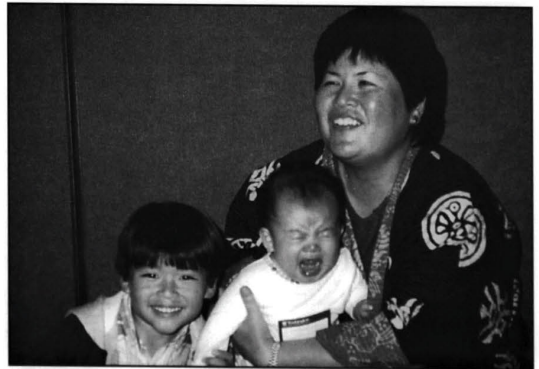

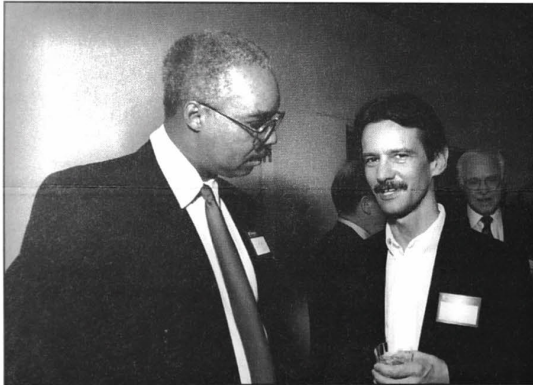

The 132nd Annual Session began with a reception on Friday evening at the King Center which is on the top floor of the Medical School Library. This location is just around the corner from the building where the School of Dental Medicine was on Scott Avenue. 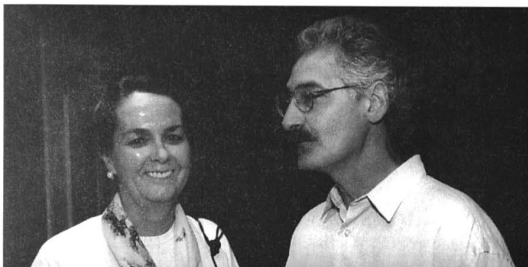

Dear Ms. Watts:

Dr. Marcus' excellent article about his World War II service and the fine care of his injuries by Dr. James Barrett Brown in the Summer 1998 issue of Washington University Magazine was one of great interest to me.

When Dr. Brown returned to Washington University after World War II ended, he brought to Washington University a brilliant oral and maxillofacial surgeon who had served with him at Valley Forge General Hospital, Dr. Leroy W. Peterson.

"Dr. Pete" as he is affectionately known, served with distinction as Professor of Oral and Maxillofacial Surgery at the School of Dentistry and head of that service at Barnes Hospital for many years. He served as President of the American Association of Oral and Maxillofacial Surgeons. He and his wife, Edith, are now enjoying their retirement in St. Louis.

Upon my release from Korean War service, I was privileged to complete my post-graduate work under Dr. Peterson. Dr. Peterson's senior resident when I arrived was the late Dr. Fred Nichols of Florida who had suffered severe maxillofacial gunshot wounds as an infantryman in Germany at the end of World War II and while a patient of Drs. Brown and Peterson at Valley Forge General Hospital was inspired to become an oral and maxillofacial surgeon.

Arnie Jacobson, '76 Recognized

A History of Caring for JCA Dentist *By Heather Vigus, Community Relations Assistant, JCA.*

Jewish Center for Aged dentist Arnold Jacobson, DDS, learned early in life about the value of giving. When he was 16-years-old, his mother enlisted his help during an employee strike at the old Jewish Center for Aged (JCA), then located on Grand and Blair Avenues. Dorothy Palans Jacobson called on her son for assistance and Jacobson volunteered his time washing dishes. Although circumstances and surroundings have changed, Jacobson continues to dedicate his time and effort at the JCA, providing on-site dental care to residents.

Today, Dr. Arnold Jacobson, part-time dentist at the JCA for the past 20 years, enables JCA residents to have dental care at home. Jacobson comes to the facility for regular dental visits once each week and, provides care for residents in the Mary and Ely Goldstein Medical Pavilion. The dental equipment is funded through the JCA Auxiliary.

Jacobson, who also maintains a private practice in Clayton with his father Dr. Sidney D. Jacobson, says that he values a tradition of serving the community, particularly those people who are unable to care for themselves. "The importance of serving our community has always been a top priority in my life," says Jacobson. "Although I am paid for dental care at the JCA, it has been a tradition in my family for as long as I can remember to give to the community through the JCA. I always feel good about what I have been able to do for others."

Jacobson's history at the JCA has been strongly influenced by two genera-

tions of women in his family. Alice Palans, Jacobson's grandmother, was the first in his family to volunteer at the JCA. In addition to being a leader in the JCA Auxiliary, her work at the facility had a positive influence on her family who would eventually carry on her tradition of giving. Jacobson's mother, Dorothy Palans Jacobson has dedicated much of her life to the Center. An Honorary Director of the JCA Board of Directors, she was the President of the JCA Auxiliary from 1972 to 1974. The old *St. Louis Globe Democrat* named her a Woman of Achievement in 1977 in recognition of her community service on behalf of the elderly. Jacobson's aunt, Ethel Atlas was President of the JCA Auxiliary from 1965 to 1967. Jacobson's parents were married at the old Jewish Center for Aged's synagogue. In 1997, Dorothy and Sid Jacobson celebrated their 60th wedding anniversary.

A year after graduation in 1976 from Washington University School of Dental

Medicine, Jacobson began serving the JCA as its dentist. "A committee determined that by providing an on-site specialist, the JCA could eliminate the need for its residents to travel to doctors.

He discusses the changes he's seen in geriatric dentistry, specifically at the center. "Younger, healthier residents mean that more residents still have their teeth and require dental attention." The increased use of psychoactive drugs to battle high blood pressure in the elderly leads to dry mouths and ultimately tooth decay, the most common ailment he finds among his patients.

Jacobson and his wife, Joan Gogel live in Webster Groves with their three daughters; Elizabeth, 14, Leigh, 13, and Laura, 11. Because the JCA has always been an important part of Jacobson's life and holds a tremendous amount of sentimental value, he says he would like to see his daughters carry out the family tradition of being an active part of the JCA.

Dr. Voda, '37 Honored

Governor Johnson proclaimed Friday, July 24, 1998 "Dr. Isadore Voda Day" in New Mexico.

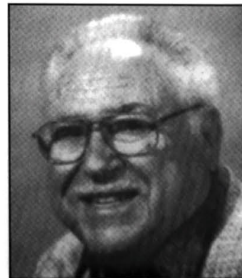
Dr. Isadore Voda, age 85, has retired from dentistry after 61 years of distinguished practice. He was elected President of the New Mexico Dental Association in 1961 and is a Fellow of the American College of Dentists, International College of Dentists, and the Academy of General Dentistry. Dr. Voda was awarded the Gold Medal of Distinction in 1989, and

the Distinguished Service Award.

Dr. Voda began his dental career in Las Vegas, New Mexico in 1937. A 1929 graduate of Las Vegas High School, he attended New Mexico Normal University, now NM Highlands, and received his dental degree from the Washington University School of Dentistry in St. Louis. After his first five years of practice, he volunteered for

military service and was commissioned as a First Lieutenant in the US Army Dental Corp, serving from 1942 to 1946. Dr. Voda returned to Las Vegas after WW II. Dr. Voda moved to Albuquerque in 1983 to work with his son, Dr. Alan Voda.

Dr. Voda serves as Chairman of the Bylaws Committee and Parliamentarian of the New Mexico Dental Association.

Alumni and School News

Recently installed officers of the Greater St. Louis Dental Society were Farhad Moshiri, '81, (also former member of the faculty and chairman of the Orthodontic department) as President; and Doxey Sheldon, '79, as Secretary-Treasurer. (She succeeds Roger Parrott, '53).

Dr. Edward Brungard who was a graduate of St. Louis University, but taught in the W.U. operative department for many years, died on April 6, 1998.

David Jolley, who has been our long-time, loyal representative and great supporter on the main campus, has been promoted to senior director of development for the School of Engineering and Applied Science. We wish him well and extend our deepest appreciation for his enthusiastic help to the Alumni Association during these last difficult years. Characteristically thoughtful, he assures us he will continue to help us in every way possible.

Alum Bill Brandhorst, '43, has brought out a book on Orthodontics, *The Flexible Appliance*. "A removable orthodontic appliance." The book has 221 pages and over 525

illustrations. The appliance described "can assume those last few months of any fixed appliance when the practitioner is trying to finish the small rotations and alignments that are so troublesome and take so much time, thereby reducing total treatment time 6 months or more." It is published by Medico Dental Media International.

Ron Gier, '59, (professor in the Department of Diagnostic Sciences at the University of Missouri at Kansas City School of Dentistry, was the subject of an article in their Alumni Newsletter (Summer, 1998). As the forensic odontologist with the ME office (Jackson County), he's been getting called to perform postmortem investigations since 1967 (40 times in the last year alone). In March he served for the first time with the western region of Missouri's Emergency Response Team. Their task was to identify the charred bodies of five parachutists and a pilot who perished in the fiery crash of a single engine plane in eastern Kansas City. Because of the severe damage to the victims bodies, they could be identified only through dental examinations. Since

the identify of the victims was known, there was a prompt response from their dentists with x-rays; and identities were established in only three days. Such timely efficient effort could not ease the families grief, but it could allow the grieving process to proceed.

Pauline Gilley, often known as "Miss Gilley", beloved longtime telephone operator-receptionist at the school, died on February 6, 1998. She was in her 90's.

Word comes from 1997 Distinguished Alumnus, Robert Gorlin, '47, that soon after last years meeting he was called to Spoleto, Italy, for the ceremony marking his win of the Italian Nobel Prize for Medical Genetics. He has also been made a Senior Member of the Institute of Medicine.

Francis J. Miller, Ortho, '64, was inducted into the American College of Dentists in October, 97. Doxey Sheldon, '79, and Ervin Harder, '60 were inducted into the International College also in October, 97.

Ed Yopez, '88, has joined Don Oliver, '63, in the practice of orthodontics in St. Louis. Ed served

six and a half years with the army before his orthodontic residency. Ed grew up in St. Louis and received his bachelors degree in chemistry also from Washington University in 1984.

David Neal, '81, and his wife Jane, also a dentist, wrote a very interesting article in the Feb. 14, '98, issue of the Focus MDA (Missouri Dental Association), titled "Dentists Married to Dentists." David had practiced with his father, Jack Neal, '45, and when father Jack retired in 1994, wife Jane stepped in. They close the article with "working together and living together has worked out well for us. Actually, there are days at the office where our paths rarely cross" but adds "we may even have an advantage over two or more unrelated partners because of our common personal and professional goals and interests that we share."

Jerry Young, '56, received the Greater St. Louis Dental Society's Gold Medal Award in September at their recent Midcontinent meeting. It is the Society's most prestigious award in recognition of Jerry's many years of outstanding service to dentistry.

Bolings Endow Scholarship

The Leroy R. and Edith Stone Boling Scholarship has been established at Linfield College in McMinnville, Oregon. The scholarship fund, which will assist financially needy students at Linfield, was created with a \$897,000 gift from the estates of Edith Stone Boling and her husband, Leroy Boling.

Edith Stone Boling and Leroy R. Boling both graduated from Linfield in 1928. She received a bachelor of

arts degree in romance languages and he received a bachelor's degree in biology. Dr. and Mrs. Boling then moved to St. Louis where he began his long and respected career at Washington University. He received a master's degree in 1930 and a PhD in 1935. He joined the faculty in the School of Dental Medicine in 1930 and was named professor anatomy in 1944. During his tenure at Washington University, he served as secretary of the faculty, registrar and assistant dean. He was the heart of the admissions commit-

tee for many years. He served as dean of the School of Dental Medicine from 1953 until 1967.

In 1968, the Bolings sold their home and most possessions and went to Vietnam. Dr. Boling worked as a consultant for the American Dental Association for "Project Vietnam", overseeing the beginnings of a dental school at Saigon University. Mrs. Boling taught English for the Ministry of Foreign Affairs in Saigon. They returned to the U.S. in 1971 where they continued their work with refugee groups. Mrs.

Boling served as a volunteer teacher of English to foreign born students until 1989.

Dr. Boling died in 1984 and Mrs. Boling in 1997. Throughout their lives they gave their energies, love and support to Linfield College and Washington University. The newly endowed scholarship fund, totaling nearly \$1 million, will benefit students at Linfield College for many generations. The work that Dr. and Mrs. Boling began many years ago continues even after their deaths - what a wonderful legacy!

Michael Matlof, '67 Dies

Michael Matlof, '67, former president of the Alumni Association (1992-93) died on June 18, 1998, at St. Lukes Hospital in St. Louis.
